He was president of the Bay County Recreation Commission.

• **Kim Biskup** — Miss Softball for the state of Michigan as a senior at Bay City All Saints in 1996, she rewrote the record book at Grand Valley State University. The GLIAC Player of the Year set the NCAA Division II home run record.

• **Stan Bromberg** — A Cleveland Indians prospect, he fired 25 career no-hitters as a Little League, Pony League and American Legion standout. A longtime local coach, he sparked the development of the All Saints baseball complex.

• **Dick Corcoran** — The 1960 all-star and honorable mention all-American at Bay City St. Mary's went on to shine at Hillsdale College and was signed by the Chicago Bears as a defensive end.

• **Brent Golk** — The 1995 Class A state champion golfer at Bay City Central, he went on to captain the Michigan State University team before becoming the Bay County Golf Course professional.

• **Michelle (Volsin) Ivey** — The career scoring leader at All Saints, she went on to set the women's basketball scoring record at Eckerd College (Fla.) while earning all-American honors.

The first woman to coach boys basketball in Alabama, she was named the state's Coach of the Year three times.

• **Ken Meylan** — The eight-time Golden Gloves regional champ was state champion in 1962. He also excelled as a race car driver in the 1960s and 1970s. Meylan died in 1998.

• **Doug Rotersuech** — Architect of the Bay City Western wrestling program, his teams won eight Saginaw Valley League titles and posted a 108-22-1 record in 13 years at Western and Bay City Handy.

• **1969 Bay City Central football team** — Elmer Engel's squad went 9-0 to win the Saginaw Valley League and claim the school's fourth of five state championships.

• **1971 Pickle Barrel softball team** — A local power on the fastpitch softball scene, the squad rolled all the way to the Class D state championship.

FRANKENMUTH — Richard Dent followed Barry Sanders on the golf course, and now he's following him into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Dent, the former Chicago Bears star, teed off Saturday at The Fortress in Frankenmuth as part of the 14th annual Valparaiso Golf Outing.

Dent, whose daughter Mary Dent is on the Valparaiso volleyball team, will join Sanders, the former Detroit Lions great, in the Jason Rich-

ardson Golf Classic. Sanders was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2004, but Dent, who retired after the 1997 season, had to wait until 2011.

"It took awhile, but the numbers speak for themselves so you always knew that one day would be your day," Dent said. "The Hall of Fame isn't something you set out to get. You learn the game, play the game, appreciate the game. And one day, maybe you get something like this."

Dent, 50, starred at defensive end for the Chicago Bears Super Bowl championship team, getting 17 sacks. In the Super Bowl, Dent had two sacks, two forced fumbles and blocked a pass.

Man who tried to scam state pleads no contest

FLINT — Convicted embezzler Rick Short could spend at least eight years behind bars after pleading no contest to two felonies Monday.

Short pleaded no contest to attempted false pretenses between \$1,000 and \$20,000 involving his RASCO start-up company and the promise of \$9 million in tax credits from the Michigan Economic Development Corp.

Short is being held at the Genesee County Jail. Sentencing is set for Aug. 30.

Unaware that Short was a convicted felon when they awarded the credits in March 2010, embar-

assed state officials took the offer of the tax credits away and vowed to implement more stringent background checks.

Short, who never received any money from the state, was charged with false pretenses after officials said he made fraudulent claims in order to get the tax breaks for a project that he claimed would bring more than 700 jobs to Flint.

He also was charged with unlawful use of a financial transaction device after officials said Short took financial advantage of a now deceased 87-year-old Flint Township neighbor with dementia.

The no contest plea to the charges is not an admission of guilt but is treated as such at sentencing.

"It's a fair resolution," said Short's attorney, Chris Christenson. Short was originally charged with racketeering, false pretenses of more than \$20,000 and attempted false pretenses. As a convicted felon, Short could have faced a maximum of life in prison if convicted.

Genesee County Prosecutor David Leyton said justice was done. "This is a good result," Leyton said. "We got him off the streets. Eight years is a long time."

Leyton said Short could receive more than eight years in prison for violating parole for a 2002 embezzlement conviction. A parole violation penalty would be served consecutive to the sentences from Monday's plea, according to the prosecutor's office.

Condition of injured firefighter upgraded

A Flint firefighter who was critically injured in a house fire Friday night has been upgraded to good condition. Gerald Hunt was hurt during a fire late Friday night on the city's east side. He jumped out of a second floor window at the home on Broadway near Lyman Street, officials said.

Hunt is being treated for lung tissue damage, second-degree burns and fractured ribs. Seven other firefighters suffered minor injuries.

GENESEE COUNTY

Storms fell trees, knock out power

A strong thunderstorm that passed through Genesee County on Monday afternoon knocked out power in parts and brought down numerous trees around the area. About 5,000 Consumers Energy customers lost power in the storm, mainly in the Fenton area, a spokeswoman said. There were numerous reports of downed wires and trees in the Fenton Township area, as well as one man's report of a funnel cloud above Jennings Road near Pierson Road in Mt. Morris Township.

"It went into the trees and it was close to the ground, but just at the top of the trees," said Richard Campbell, 66, of Mt. Morris. "The trees are just bent every which way."

The National Weather Service said it had not received a report of any tornadoes in Genesee County. For Campbell, who lived through the Beecher tornado of 1953, one sight of the cloud was enough. "I got the back out of there, I did," he said. No injuries were reported from Monday's storm.

FLINT — Kadajah Powell was trying to walk seven miles home to her 5-month-old daughter early Sunday morning when she was struck and killed on North Dort Highway near Coldwater Road in Genesee Township, said Powell's mother.

Powell, 17, was walking along the side of the road with a group of friends from Skateland Arena in Mt. Morris Township when she was hit by a southbound sport utility vehicle, Genesee Township police said. The SUV left the scene before authorities arrived.

"She was a nice, outgoing person," said the teen's mother, Lynnette Powell, holding Kadajah's daughter in her lap on her West Marengo Avenue porch in north Flint.

"She looks around and doesn't see her, starts screaming and crying," she said of her granddaughter. "I have to take her for a walk to calm her down. I don't know what to do about that baby. She sure misses her mama."

Powell, 52, said her daughter and a group of friends were left without a ride home from a party at Skateland Arena because they didn't have gas money.

She last spoke to her daughter about 3 a.m. Sunday when the teen phoned to tell her they planned to walk home.

Powell said she tried calling police to find a ride home for her daughter but received a call at 4:30 a.m. from one of the girl's friends telling her about the crash.

Family members said Kadajah Powell attended at high school competition classes in Beecher and Flint and enjoyed dancing, basketball, dodgeball and caring for her daughter.

"She loved her daughter," said her aunt Camille Powell, 40. "She loved spending time with her daughter. The family hopes the SUV driver surrenders to police."

"That wasn't right what (the driver) did," said Lynnette Powell. Anyone with information is asked to call Genesee Township Police at 810-640-2000.

efficiency, the best technology and compelling design would continue in the next generation trucks.

GM and UAW officials shared the stage at Flint Assembly to make Monday's announcement.

The two sides will start negotiations next week on a new national contract.

Both sides said they want to work together to fairly pay employees yet keep company costs in check during the period covered by the new national contract.

UAW International Vice President Joe Ashton said the union wants the company to keep up investments in communities like Flint and bring jobs back to the U.S.

"I hope I'm here for another announcement in the near future about bringing more jobs to Flint..." Ashton said. "I'd like to see everything brought back from Mexico."

Monday's announcement is the latest in what has been a string of positive news at the truck plant — from trim to body shop to robotics.

In June, the company was granted a state tax break for a proposed \$417 million paint facility on Van Slyke Road, and in January, officials announced the addition of

a third shift at the plant. Bill Viscio, an analyst for edmunds.com, said GM's next generation of trucks is critical as the company goes head-to-head with Ford's F-series trucks.

GM's next generation truck was shelved as the company struggled and fell into bankruptcy in 2009.

One year ago, GM bulked up its 2011 model Silverado and Sierra trucks, putting off the re-engineering and redesign.

"Everyone is trying to figure out what the pick-ups' place will be" in the future, Viscio said. "People who were buying trucks for every day use ... those buyers have gone ... It's going to be intriguing to see what direction GM is taking (with the next generation)."

"What do they have to make (trucks) more responsive to the dynamics of the market," including higher gas prices, Viscio said.

Most every area of the 3.7-million-square-foot Flint Assembly plant will be touched by the retooling — from trim to the body shop to robotics.

"It's going to take in every level of the plant," Rouse said.

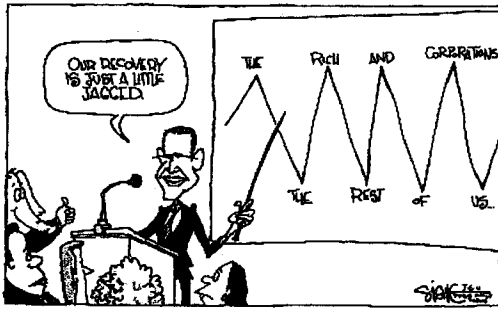

Legislative Roundup

Last week in Lansing

Welfare limit — The state Senate on Wednesday approved a four-year limit for families receiving welfare benefits on a 24-12 vote, with Democrats as a bloc to oppose it, according to The Detroit News. Sen. Roger Kahn, R-Saginaw, voted for the bills. The state House already had approved similar legislation and will have to agree to changes made in the Senate. The measure then goes to Republican Gov. Rick Snyder for his signature. Critics say the limits would boot some needy families off public assistance. About 12,600 families would be removed from welfare rolls by Oct. 1, saving the state more than \$77 million. Michigan's current law has a similar time limit. It is to expire in late September.

Last week in Washington

Light bulbs — Republicans who take a dim view of new light bulb standards failed to repeal them in a debate that focused on whether the government is once again exerting too much control over people's lives. The House voted 233-193 Tuesday for legislation to eliminate energy-efficiency standards incandescent bulbs do not meet. Rep. Dave Camp, R-Midland, voted for the measure; Rep. Dale E. Day 193: 50-something pensioners take biggest tax hit

What happened: The House Fiscal Agency releases a report showing varying impacts on taxpayers under the overhaul crafted by Gov. Rick Snyder and Republican lawmakers.

A retired couple born after 1952 with more than \$50,000 in income — including \$48,000 in pension benefits — and the full \$1,200 homestead property tax credit will pay \$3,150 more in taxes in 2013, according to the analysis.

A couple born before 1952, with roughly the same income but a pension that remains tax free, faces a much smaller tax bite, \$430. That hike is the result of losing the homestead credit.

The credit's loss affects middle-class wage earners, too. A two-child couple making \$55,000 will take nearly the same tax hit, \$329, as the same household making \$250,000, \$389.

Why it matters: The Michigan Supreme Court is reviewing the plan's constitutionality precisely because pension and age-based impacts help drive the \$1.4 billion that would be raised the first full year.

Day 194: Senate OKs stricter 48-month time limit for welfare benefits

What happened: On a party-line 24-12 vote, Senate Republicans approve a House-passed measure that would force 12,600 recipients of welfare rolls on Oct. 1. The bill removes discretion by caseworkers to authorize extensions beyond a 48-month time limit.

"Some (caseworkers) were very lenient," said Sen. Judy Emmons, R-Sheridan. "No one ever expected it to be a lifetime entitlement." But critics worry about what's next. "What's going to happen to these folks? Has anyone thought of that?" asked Sen. Morris Hood, D-Detroit.

Why it matters: The bill has to go back to the House, so Snyder is unlikely to sign it before Labor Day. That's a month before cutoff.

Day 194: Agreement elusive on public employee health costs

What happened: Senate Republicans unanimously reject the House GOP's version of a requirement that public employees pay more for health insurance.

Originally, Senate Bill 7 limited state and local public employers to paying no more than 50 percent of health benefits. The House prefers providing the option of a hard dollar limit on employer liability — \$15,000 for a family plan and \$5,500 for an individual policy.

Why it matters: Both sides will work over the summer to reach agreement on an issue Senate leaders say is filled with complications.

Day 194: Michigan filmmaking would get new lease on life

What happened: Senate Majority Leader Randy Richardville unveils a plan to give Michigan film incentives a more permanent future. The five-year plan would provide grants of up to 30 percent for some production costs, such as pay for Michigan residents. Productions at Michigan-owned studios would receive a bonus of 2 to 5 percentage points.

The old program that provided up to 42 percent of a film's Michigan production costs expires this year. Snyder agreed to fund \$25 million in grants the next two years, but uncertainty is driving productions elsewhere.

Richardville, R-Morroe, isn't averse to spending the \$100 million annually the state roughly spends now. "I think we want to show that there is a commitment to the industry over a period of time," he said.

Why it matters: Snyder doesn't think film incentives makes sense given the small return to state coffers. But he's running into some opposition from fellow Republicans. They say the correct view is the program's impact on the overall economy.



CARACAS, Venezuela — Lawmakers approved a request by President Hugo Chavez to travel to Cuba on Saturday to undergo chemotherapy, and the Venezuelan leader said he would leave within hours for a new phase of cancer treatment.

The unanimous vote came after a passionate debate in which opposition politicians said they supported the president's right to receive treatment but disputed his plan to remain in charge while in Havana. Opposition lawmakers also demanded more information about his illness.

Chavez said opposition politicians were wrong to call for him to delegate duties to Vice President Elias Jaua while away and that he would maintain his position as president.

"I will come back much better than I am right now," Chavez said in televised remarks from the presidential palace after the legislative session.

The socialist leader said he would leave Saturday for Havana and that he expects to be back soon. He did not say how long he would be away.

State television showed on a split-screen image both the legislative session and Chavez listening from the presidential palace with his Cabinet ministers. At one point, he digitally interjected himself into the session shortly after one opposition lawmaker called for the president's duties to be temporarily delegated to the vice president.

"What stupidity," Chavez said, dismissing those who raised such questions as "spokesmen of the right."

Chavez said they had been "bordering on ridiculousness" during the debate.

Opposition lawmakers, who hold a minority of seats in the National Assembly, said they support Chavez's request to leave for Cuba but that they believed it constituted a "temporary absence" and that the president owed the country a more detailed

explanation of how serious his illness is.

Pro-Chavez lawmakers argued that proper procedures were being followed and that Chavez would remain

fully in charge while away. They clapped for Chavez and chanted: "Onward commander!"

Events have developed quickly since Chavez

announced Friday that he would fly back to Cuba. That's where he spent much of June undergoing surgery to remove an abscess and a cancerous tumor in his pelvic

region before he made a surprise return home July 4.

"This second phase will begin in the next days with the application of chemotherapy, scientifically planned, in detail," Chavez said after a meeting with Peruvian President-elect Ollanta Humala on Friday.

The president's press office announced plans for a send-off ceremony at Caracas' international airport on Saturday afternoon.

"Let him go to Cuba," opposition lawmaker Alfonso Marquina said during the debate. "But we also demand compliance with the constitution... so that he doesn't continue governing from Havana, Cuba."

Marquina said the opposition believes Chavez's request qualifies as a "temporary absence." Under Venezuela's constitution, the vice president may take the president's place during temporary absences of up to 90 days, which the National Assembly may extend for 90 days more for a total of about six months.

Clinton chides NATO ally Turkey on human rights

ISTANBUL — U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, chiding a NATO ally whose support is critical to American goals in the Middle East, said Saturday that Turkey must act on concerns about backsliding on human rights and its secular traditions.

Speaking politely but firmly about the moderate Muslim nation, Clinton said the recent arrests of dozens of journalists and curbs placed on religious freedom were "inconsistent" with Turkey's economic and political progress.

She said Turkey should recommit itself to the course of modernization and embrace the democratic institutions of statehood. By doing so, Turkey could serve as a model for Arab nations now in the midst of revolt or transition, America's top diplomat said.

"Across the region, people in the Middle East and North Africa are seeking to draw lessons from Turkey's experience," she told reporters at a news conference with Tur-

key's foreign minister, Ahmet Davutoglu. Turkey's history serves as a reminder that democratic development also depends on responsible leadership.

She called on the Turkish people to use their constitutional reform process to "address concerns... about recent restrictions on freedom of expression, religious freedom and protection for the rights of minorities."

Those concerns have stalled Turkey's bid to join the European Union and further cement ties with the West. Clinton noted that the U.S. long has backed Turkey's EU membership.

At a town hall event earlier where she took questions from young Turks, Clinton criticized the arrests of journalists and the curbs on religious freedom, but she also had fears about threats to press freedom in the majority Muslim nation.

"I do not think it is necessary or in Turkey's interest to be cracking down. It seems to me inconsistent with all the other advances Turkey has made," she said.

Turkey's institutions should be able to handle the scrutiny and debate that a free press brings, Clinton said.

Turkish media groups say more than 60 journalists are in jail. The groups accuse authorities of using flimsy evidence to bring the charges.

Government officials said in April there were 26 journalists in Turkey for activities unrelated to journalism. Officials have cited the role of some media sectors over the decades in fanning support for coups led by the Turkish military, a staunch supporter of the secular system.

The Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, of which Turkey is a member, says 57 journalists are in jail in Turkey, mostly on anti-terror charges. That includes people with alleged ties to Turkish rebels and extremists.

Clinton's comments were likely to encourage more liberal Turks but irritate Turkey's leaders, including Davutoglu and Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan.

A small group protesting Clinton's visit outside the

U.S. Embassy in Istanbul, one man holding a Turkish flag staged a protest as Clinton met Orthodox Patriarchate Bartholomew, accusing Washington of "killing millions of Muslims."

Erdogan, long seen as a vital bridge between East and West, has worried some by taking steps at odds with U.S. and Western policies.

He insists that his ruling party, which has Islamist roots, is committed to secularism. But since President Barack Obama took office, Erdogan has clashed with Israel and opposed U.N. sanctions on Iran over its nuclear program.

During George W. Bush's administration, Turkey opposed the war in Iraq and refused to allow troops to enter Iraq from its territory, creating additional divisions over the conflict within NATO.

At the coffee house, Clinton also urged Turkey to continue to embrace inclusive traditions and serve as the East-West bridge, without choosing one or the other.

"I don't think there is any reason for Turkey to shift from West to East," she said. "As an outsider, I have always thought the debate is a debate without real meaning to it because why would you give up one for another? You can look both ways and to me that is an incredible advantage."

Britain ponders press reform amid scandal

LONDON — Britain has been transfixed by the phone-hacking scandal that has shaken its media world. But will it really change the nation's press?

Much depends on the shelf life of the outrage over alleged skulduggery by journalists working for British papers owned by Rupert Murdoch, who closed a newspaper, dropped a major business deal and agreed to testify before parliament in an attempt to defuse the uproar.

An inquiry authorized by Prime Minister David Cameron and a criminal investigation aim to clear up this particular mess, but reforming the media and untangling cozy ties between politics and the press, which some call an embedded cultural defect, require the public's attention in the long term.

Without grassroots pressure, Britain's press will have less incentive to change.

But there's a fundamental dilemma: Even as Britons recoil at trashy tabloid tactics, they have bought such papers by the millions — hungry for juicy gossip obtained by the very illegal means

they decry.

Murdoch's now-shattered News of the World was Britain's second best-selling paper, just behind its sister tabloid, The Sun.

"The public's interest in these matters is fickle to say the least," said Steven Felding, professor of political history at the University of Nottingham. "Murdoch is probably thinking, 'Well, if I can last for about six months, then everything will return back to normal.'"

Felding said Britons were more concerned about the economy, jobs, services and quality of life, especially at a time when the government is implementing painful austerity measures aimed at getting the country's finances in order.

Martin Moore, a founder of Hacked Off, a group that seeks full accountability in the phone-hacking allegations, said he was concerned that a "summer hiatus" could cool tempers and chip away at momentum for reform.

"This is a moment and an opportunity to change things," he said.

In a speech on Thursday, Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg said Britain should

look beyond the scandal and implement changes that will guarantee freedom of the press, which he described as the "lifeblood" of democracy, but also ensure accountability through robust corporate governance, and a solid framework that fosters diversity of ownership of media organizations.

"I know that there is real fear, among reformers, that this opportunity will pass us by. That there will be plenty of heat, but no light," Clegg said. "The pessimists have a point. In recent decades the political class has consistently failed to stand up to the media. Seeking to curry favor with powerful media barons or prevent their own person-

"I don't enjoy it this hot," she said. "You try to balance it out."

Normal highs this time of year are about 83 degrees, with lows reaching closer to 60 degrees, Dukeshner said. Nightly temperatures aren't expected to drop below 70 degrees this week.

Thursday is shaping up to be the hottest day this week, with early forecasts showing temperatures in the mid-90s and a heat index between 101 and 106 degrees, Dukeshner said.

an impasse developed with state employee unions in negotiating the concessions by Oct. 1. The six state employee unions have agreed to sit down with state officials before Oct. 1 to discuss a new two-year contract to begin Dec. 31, but none of them has yet agreed to reopen the current contract to negotiate concessions, Weiss said.

Ray Holman, spokesman for United Auto Workers Local 6000, which represents nearly 17,000 social service workers and other state employees, declined to comment about negotiations with state officials. But he said he is dismayed the state is making preparations to lay off employees.

public safety hazard," Holman said.

Nearly 14,000 state employees work in mid-Michigan, making it the region's largest employer.

Sara Wurfel, spokeswoman for Snyder, acknowledged the state employee workforce has declined by 12,900, or 21 percent, over the past decade, but added that the state employee compensation has increased by 38 percent in that time.

of new hiring in the auto industry and other signs that Michigan's still-fragile economy is regaining some strength, Rick Wackelawek of the state's Bureau of Labor Market Information and Strategic Initiatives said the season that brighter days ahead seems justified.

"The precipitous decline we've seen in the past few years has stopped and we're kind of holding our own now," he said. "We've bottomed out."

Business remains scarce commodity among voters still dealing with

high rates of home foreclosures — Michigan ranks seventh nationally — rising college costs and growing public-sector layoffs.

Fifty-one percent of voters in the July 9-11 telephone poll said the state's on the wrong track, while only a third said it's headed in the right direction and 16 percent were undecided.

That's slightly better than in late May, when the wrong track-right direction numbers were 55 percent and 28 percent, respectively.

The latest poll also showed voters are about evenly split in their opinions of the Republican governor who took office in January, with 41 percent giving Syn-

der a favorable rating and 60 percent giving him an unfavorable rating, with 19 percent undecided.

That's slightly better than in late May, when 38 percent had a favorable view and 42 percent had an unfavorable view.

Half of voters remained unhappy with Snyder's performance.

Fifty-seven percent gave him a negative job rating, compared to 60 percent in late May. Those giving him a positive job rating climbed from 27 percent in late May

to 34 percent in July.

Snyder spokeswoman Sara Wurfel said the governor noted the slight improvement in his poll results.

The governor knew full well the path ahead wasn't going to be easy or popular, she said. "He remains fully committed to making the tough decisions that ensure Michigan turns the corner and sees brighter, stronger days for all. He's hopeful that Michigan will be revitalized and witness that his approach of relentless positive action will make a difference. This may be one small sign in that direction."

Workforce at 47,100

Holman said the state workforce, now at 47,100, is at bare bones and that corrections and social service staffs particularly can't handle cuts.

"If we get to a situation where there is going to be layoffs, it's going to be a

The U.S. Census Bureau lists Michigan's senior poverty rate at 7.7 percent. But researchers say that figure is based on outdated and inaccurate methods. The Elder Index benchmarks the actual cost of living based on more extensive community data than the Census number.

That \$19,521 could be enough for a senior who lives in a paid-for house in a community with low taxes, or spell disaster for a senior with a mortgage or who lives in a more expensive community.

Living on benefits

Marilyn Bask, 81, of Lansing, said she's feeling the economic pain. A widow, she lost her job in 2005 and went through her savings. She now lives on Social Security benefits payments and a stipend from the Retired Senior Volunteer Program.

Bush enjoys having an income from that job but has been off for the past several weeks because of health issues.

It doesn't amount to much but it does help you," she said. "I know my tax is coming due and right now I'm wondering how I'm going to get the money to pay it."

White said the report underscores the need for legislators to maintain or improve Social Security benefits.

"We need policymakers to understand that this population that we used to feel was relatively comfortable







Hunting Season

Hunt is on in region for next 10 months

Michigan hunters, depending on their quarry, would typically circle September, October, or November as hunting's most sacred month, but July is just as important as its fall counterparts, maybe more so.

With coyote season opened on Friday, July — a month steeped in patriotism and sunshine — starts the ball rolling on a 10-month period that provides continuous hunting opportunities for one species or another. Coyote season is easily the longest of the hunting seasons on

Michigan's slate. Running from July 15 to April 15, hunters have most of the calendar year to set their sights on the abundant area coyote population.

As fall nears, the number of open hunting seasons will grow exponentially, including the arrival of the king of all things hunting, firearms deer season.

Though deer season will always dominate Michigan's hunting calendar, several hundred thousand hunters head to the woods each year to pursue game other than deer. Waterfowl, turkeys, small game, and predators each have a cult following.

The hunting seasons in Cheboygan County are listed below.

- Coyote: July 15-April 15
- Gray/Red Fox: Oct. 15-March 1
- Raccoon: Oct. 1-Jan. 31
- Bear: Regular Sept. 16-24, Archery Oct. 7-13

funds to cover the water component of the project, with MDOT handling the rest.

The city's water main is 110 years old and is undersized with a four-inch diameter, according to Heffle. The water main is constantly leaking and is also resting on the state's storm drain after years of vibrations and wear from traffic has worn

away the buffer between them. The water component of the project includes a new 12-inch water main, as well as new hydrants, valves and services.

City officials saw an opportunity to hit two birds with one stone by completing a road reconstruction and streetscape along M-68 since it would already be torn up for the water main replacement. The reconstruction was already on MDOT's project list to be completed but just needed to be bumped up in priority. The section of road-

way has not been resurfaced in more than 60 years.

MDOT is also funding new asphalt, sidewalks, curbs, gutters and storm drains for the entire 1.5-mile length of M-68 through downtown Onaway. The existing sidewalks currently do not meet MDOT standards, since they don't run continuously

through a high pedestrian traffic area.

Additional funding was obtained for streetscape improvements, which will include new lamp posts, flower planters, stamped concrete brick pavers for sidewalks and trash cans.

fluid dynamics tools, which results in an extremely aerodynamic car.

The way the car is powered really illustrates the engineering capabilities of the team members. The solar panels are Gallium Arsenide, triple-junction cells which are similar to the solar cells found on space satellites. Cell efficiency is above 28 percent. The peak for the array output for the car is more than 2 kilowatts.

Running on lithium-ion phosphate batteries, enough energy is stored to drive about 250 miles without any incoming solar power.

The UM team's solar race strategy involves developing detailed mathematic models of the various systems of the vehicle and using these models to predict vehicle performance during the race. They also take into account weather data from a team meteorologist, which allows them to optimize energy consumption.

The group, complete with chase vehicles, videographer and Web bloggers who update the team's travel status, blew through Cheboygan late Tuesday morning and by late afternoon had completed a stop in Alpena and were already camped in Tawas.
