Conservation group sues over state's boat ban

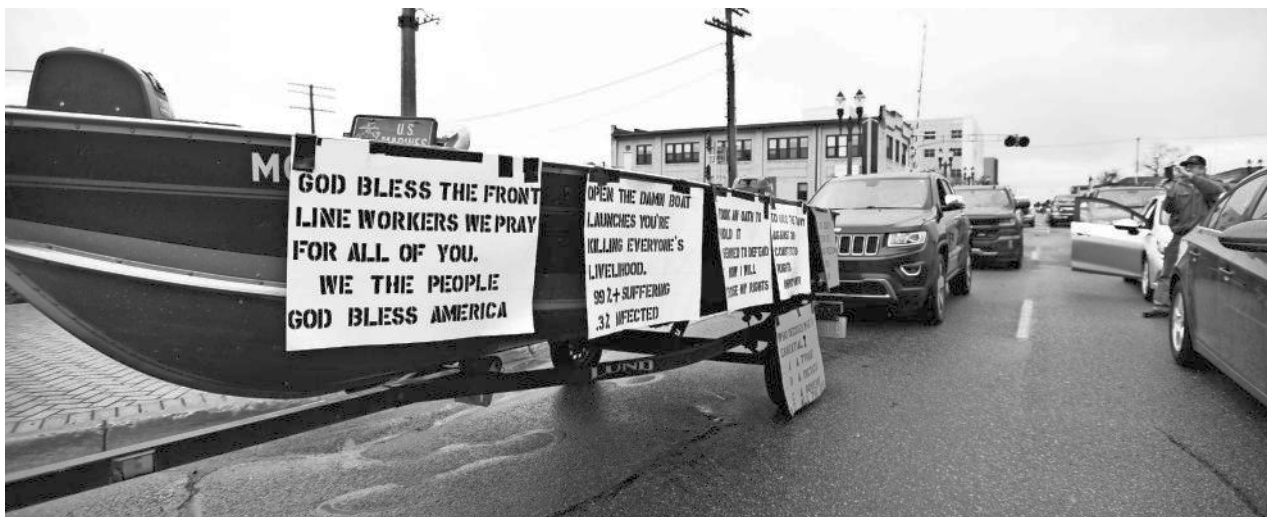
Complaint filed to strike down Whitmer's order

LANSING — A statewide conservation group is asking a judge to strike down Michigan's temporary ban on the use of motor-powered boats as unconstitutional.

The Michigan United Conservation Clubs, a consortium of local groups that together count more than 40,000 members, filed a complaint Sunday in U.S. District Court in Grand Rapids against Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and Michigan Department of Natural Resources Director Daniel Eichinger.

The complaint is among several suits filed against Whitmer by landscapers, cottage owners and sportsmen over her executive orders regarding the COVID-19 pandemic.

MUCC said it has supported the state's closure of Tippy Dam and other sites where anglers were not complying with social-distancing rules intended to slow the spread of COVID-19, the disease caused by the new coronavirus.

But Whitmer's blanket ban on motorboat use is unwarranted and unconstitutional, MUCC said in a news release. The group is asking the court to block its enforcement.

"Michigan anglers and recreational boaters have a constitutional right to clear and unambiguous rules, especially when violation of those rules can be criminally charged," said Aaron Phelps, a Grand Rapids attorney who represents MUCC. "Citizens cannot be subject to criminal penalties based on arbitrary interpretations of a unilateral order or, worse, vague responses to so-called frequently asked questions."

The governor's office does not comment on pending litigation, a spokeswoman for Whitmer said.

The ban on motorized boat use falls under Whitmer's expanded stay-home order, which allows outdoor activities such as kayaking and canoeing and doesn't mention motorboats. But Whitmer's office later clarified the order to say that all gasoline- and electric-powered motorboats are prohibited.

The DNR said the ban on motorized watercraft is intended to slow the spread of the coronavirus by limiting travel and close contact at boat ramps and gas stations. The agency received "many reports" of crowded boat launches where boaters were not following social-distancing guidelines, officials said.

MUCC said the blanket ban is unfair and contradictory.

Electric boat motors are banned, while gas-powered recreational vehicles are still allowed on trails, the group said. Moreover, kayakers and canoeists use gasoline to get to lakes and rivers and use the same access sites as motorboaters, it said.

"Sailboats often require multiple people and motors but are allowed, according to the state's interpretation," the group said in its release. "Out-of-state anglers can travel freely to Michigan to fish. Yet, a person

living on a lake cannot walk out their back door and utilize their motorboat."

For anglers, it doesn't help that the ban comes during the highly anticipated spring walleye, steelhead and sucker runs. And many people have come to rely on the high-quality protein and mental health benefits they get from fishing, MUCC said.

During the massive "gridlock" protest at the state Capitol last week, some people towed boats behind their vehicles or attached flags or messages to the end of fishing rods to protest Whitmer's orders.

Even an elected prosecutor in the Upper Peninsula has weighed in on the debate, saying he has no problem with people fishing in a motorboat in his county under certain conditions.

Baraga County Prosecutor Joseph O'Leary said there's nothing in Whitmer's order that specifically bans riding in a motorboat. Yet, that's not how the order has been explained by the governor's office, he said.

The order says kayaking and canoeing are "outdoor physical activities" that are allowed.

"In my opinion, fishing is an outdoor physical activity with or without a motor attached," O'Leary said on the county's website.

He said two people from different households sitting at opposite ends of a boat "are very unlikely to have a problem with my office."

But O'Leary warned against people sitting side-by-side and sharing a bottle, or a group of people in boats tied up with other boats. He said "common sense" should apply.

Amy Trotter, MUCC's executive director, said the group's decision to sue came after "countless hours of deliberations, sleepless nights, a member survey and consultations."

"MUCC members, our friends and our families have been greatly impacted by this virus, and we mourn the losses to our great state," Trotter said in the news release.

to grow their own vegetables, and it means a savings for them," the mayor said. "You don't have to go to the store to buy it, (although) it takes time to grow it. ... And it's a nice family project to do when everyone's home."

How did the 'sprouts' program get started?

Last week, officials set aside about \$15,000 of \$462,000 in additional community development grant dollars — allocated to the city this month as a COVID-19 relief package — for a food gardening program.

Those interested can arrange for seeds to be mailed to them by emailing sprouts@porthuron.org.

The city was also making 50 prepackaged packets of seeds available for pick-up on Tuesday outside the Municipal Office Center, 100 McMorran Blvd., where City Manager James Freed watched several residents swing by from his office midday. He had posted an announcement on social media.

That's where resident Sarah Nowak said she saw it.

"I had a heart attack earlier this year, and I have to eat heart-healthy," she said. "I have to eat lots of veggies, so I'm going to try and do my own garden."

"I just thought it was a really awesome thing because we're all stuck at home right now anyway," Nowak added. "Anybody that can come out and get one should come."

MiGardener owner Luke Marion, who operates an online store, social media and a popular YouTube channel with wife Sindy, said the Sprouts effort was the sort of gardening awareness they hoped to program with their business, adding they've "been very outspoken as a company when it comes to community involvement."

He said the variety of veggies they chose to put in the packets was based on what might best fit a new gardener, someone who may be gardening in a small area or in containers, and what might be of a "higher price point at the store."

Things like corn, Marion said, were not included because they take up a lot of space and are fairly expensive.

"We do kind of see a common trend. What we wanted to do was pick varieties that (gardeners) would not only use and benefit from but would also be able to be grown for a wide variety of people," he said. "... They're highly nutritious, which is just important from a sustenance standpoint, but they also tend to be more expensive."

Could this program continue if successful?

If the program proved to be successful, Repp said it was something they would consider continuing.

But she said they wanted to see how well the 1,000 packets did at the start of the growing season.

Marion also said they'd be interested if the city wanted to extend Sprouts. But he said they may need some notice to make sure seeds are available.

"The only issue right now is staffing and also supplies," he said. "Because of the shortages, we had everyone all hands on deck working day in and day out to meet the deadline to get them in time in the city's hands. It put a strain on our resources just because we're short-staffed already. But our packets and (what) we get from our farmers, everyone's in the same boat. Things just take a lot longer."

On Tuesday, Nowak said she hadn't done gardening before and was hoping to get some help from her sister.

"We're hoping it'll be OK," she said with a laugh.

For newcomers like Nowak, Marion encouraged people to look for the "huge list of resources" MiGardener discusses on its Facebook and YouTube pages.

Overall, he said, "We encourage people to learn how to grow their food," to "get in touch with where food comes from" and learn "how important a resource it is."
